Course Description:

This course will teach you how to write, execute, and debug C language programs. We will cover the first 7 chapters of the Kernighan & Ritchie book and Chapter 8 if time permits. Topics include: introduction to C; types, operators and expressions; control flow; functions and program structure; pointers and arrays; structures; input and output.

Prerequisites: CS110 or CS115L

Co-requisites: CS210

Textbook: The C Programming Language, 2nd Edition, Kernighan & Ritchie, Prentice Hall

Evaluation

A lot of practice is required in this class. There will be 5 homework assignments, 3 tests, and 1 final exam. Each homework will be a programming challenge, in which students are required to write C programs to solve a given set of programming problems. Homework may be submitted <u>late but by no more than 24 hours (holidays counted)</u>. Late submission is subject to a <u>10% penalty</u> on the score. No makeup exam/test is allowed.
