Course Descriptions:

This course will teach you how to write, execute, and debug C language programs. Topics include: introduction to C, types, operators and expressions, control flow, functions and program structure, pointers and arrays, structures, input and output.

In the beginning weeks, we will be covering UNIX basics. This will teach you how to get around the UNIX/LINUX system: editing, creating directory files, access to other directory files, compilation, assembly, makefile, script files, debugger, and shells.
